If you stroll down the 100 block of East Price Street in Germantown, you will find a flurry of activity in Face to Face's parking lot.

The pandemic forced a shift from the vibrant community center inside our building to a bustling operation outside, under tents, across the asphalt. Our guests lack the phones and internet access needed to engage and follow up with us during the COVID-19 crisis. Your support enabled the creation of makeshift offices in our parking lot by adding a Wi-Fi hotspot and erecting tents under which our guests meet with legal, health, and social services, in person, on our food distribution days.

As one of the only Philadelphia civil legal centers doing in person intakes during the pandemic, Face to Face Legal Center is applying for birth certificates, filing petitions for expungements, and addressing problems related to stimulus payments and unemployment.

A longtime resident of Germantown and friend of Face to Face reached out to the legal center seeking guidance with elder legal issues. Our attorney drafted a health care proxy, power of attorney and will ensuring her end of life wishes will be carried out and a future tangled title avoided. Your generosity brought comfort to this 90-year-old and her family.



Our social service center is assisting guests with a staggering number of housing issues. Renee, a 70 year-old guest, was concerned about a burning smell near the circuit breaker box in her home. It was determined that nearby air ducts posed a fire risk and needed a cost prohibitive deep cleaning. Your generosity helped Renee with the cleaning fee and made

her feel safe in

her home.



Your support helped bring COVID-19 testing to Germantown. Through a partnership initiated with Philadelphia FIGHT, Face to Face Health Center hosts periodic COVID-19 testing. Guests also receive blood pressure monitoring and general health screenings.



Mercy Neighborhood Ministries preschoolers back in our building for the start of the school year. Our family liaison initiates casual interactions with parents when they pick up their children. As she learns about their needs, she connects them to our legal, health and social services, as necessary. The family liaison also supports families throughout the daunting elementary school selection, enrollment, and scholarship application processes.

YOUR SUPPORT HELPS RELIEVE HUNGER

Job loss, rising food costs and the economic downturn due to the ongoing pandemic have pushed more individuals and families into food insecurity.

ugust 2020 study from the US Department of Agriculture reports that levels of hunger in the United States have almost tripled since 2019.

In Philadelphia, one in five residents are food insecure. Food distribution lines at Face to Face are growing and approximately two-thirds of our guests are new. Since March 20, 2020, in partnerships with Step Up to the Plate and Food Connect, we have distributed over 16,000 grab-and-go meals from Jose Garces, Peachtree Catering, and Wawa.





We are extending our services into the community by delivering food bags to guests who can no longer travel to us. We are also transporting meals to Emlen Arms, Oak Street Health, House of Healing, Faith Chapel, Interfaith Hospitality Network, New Pathways Project and others in need of food.

We continue to offer a free fresh food market with a variety of vegetables from Carversville Farm and our own garden, plus donated milk, eggs and bags of healthy pantry-stable food items. The non-perishable items are packed by our nursing staff to ensure they are nutritionally balanced and include important health information. With more families in need, we have now distributed over 800 larger-sized food boxes [since the start of the pandemic].



Coffee Chat

It's 10am and Face to Face's dining room coordinator rolls a cart loaded with coffee, tea and fixings down the parking lot to the growing line of guests along the sidewalk. Guests are offered a hot beverage of choice while they chat with friends and wait for food distribution and program services to begin.

As Sharon sips her coffee, she talks about the community she found at Face to Face and how it helped her over the last two years. The legal center obtained her birth certificate, social services provided necessary toiletries, and the health center monitored her blood pressure. She still enjoys the camaraderie of her neighbors on food distribution days but misses sharing a hot meal with them in our dining room. "Face to Face, you saved my life and I am so thankful you are here".
